Phila. Suburban Schoolboy Age Also Betters Lafayette Standard as Mates Score 451-2 Points for P. I. A. A. Honors at Easton 5/17/1930

Easton, Pa., May 17.—Dick Sigel, Lower Merion High athlete, broke the Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic Association record for the discus with a throw of 127 feet 1 1/2 inches, bettering the P. I. A. A. mark by more than five feet as his teammates piled up 45 1/2 points to win the track and field championships held here today by District No. 1 of the P. I. A. A.

Sigel, in setting the new mark, also beat the Lafayette College record of 125 feet 4 inches, which has been standing since 1918. The P. I. A. A. record is 120 feet 3 inches. Taking four first places and placing men in ten out of the twelve events, Lower Merion romped away with the meet, beating Norristown, its closest rival, by 17 1/2 points.
