

Blows Faster Than Babe Did in 1927, When He Made 60

Eight days ahead of Babe Ruth's record home-run schedule! That's the spot occupied by Jimmy Foxx, slugging first baseman of the Athletics, who collected his twelfth and thirteenth four-base hits of the season at the expense of the Boston Red Sox yesterday.

four runs, batted home forty-two times and sports fifty-two hits. He drove in six runs yesterday.

Foxx, invading the Yankee Stadium today, where the Elephants will battle Ruth and his mates, maintained his margin over the Bambino, who found Washington pitching for a pair of his specialties, giving him a total of ten.

The A's star, who has been compiling a record batting average this season, as well as topping both major leagues in the number of runs scored, runs batted home and hits made, has listed his thirteenth round-tripper on the records for May 21.

In 1927, when Ruth established his record total of sixty four-baggers, he did not connect for his thirteenth homer until May 29. The Big Bam started that season with four blows in April, just as Foxx did this year, but needed nearly a month to pick up nine more, while Foxx has required only three weeks.

Foxx made his first four homers this season within a week after the start of the pennant race, then played nine more games before he connected for No. 5, on May 2. Since that time the greatest number of games in succession in which he has been collared, so far as round-trip blows were concerned, is three.

Foxx now has hit in his last eleven games, but his average slipped 15 points to .452, as he made only two homers in eight official tries. He has scored thirty-

IN DISTRICT 1 MEET

Ends 17-Year Reign of Lower Merion High in Cinder-path Circles

Upper Darby High School's cinderpath artists achieved a feat of considerable note yesterday afternoon, when they ended the seven-year reign of Lower Merion High as P. I. A. A. District No. 1 champion in the Class A competition on Memorial Field, Upper Darby.

Roy Wolfgang's trackmen compiled a total of 47 points to annex honors in the main division of the smoothly run meet. The points gave the Purple and Gold a convincing conquest of the Ardmore squad, which took second honors, with 33½ points.

Ambler and Swarthmore High waged a keen battle for the team award in the newly created Class B of the P. I. A. A. rivalry and the Ambler contingent amassed 62½ points for the initial honors. Swarthmore banked 50½ points.

Unlike other years, the team championships are not as important as the individual placing so far as the State scholastic crown is concerned. In previous years the winning team as a whole was eligible to compete in the State meet, but this season only the first two finishers in each event are permitted to vie for the Keystone laurels. Altoona will be the scene of the Pennsylvania title tests next Saturday.

Norristown High, with Irving Brown in the stellar role, took third place in Class A. Next in order followed: Haverford High, 25; West Chester, 23½; Ridley Park, 21½; Lansdale, 6; Cheltenham, 3; Coatesville, 3; Sellersville-Perkasie, 3, and Glen-Nor, 1.

Prospect Park was third in Class B with 29½ points, Eddystone tallied 22½, West Conshohocken 12, North Coventry 9, Pennsburg 6 and Nether-Providence 4.

Phil Barbaron, of Ambler and Brown, of Norristown, annexed the individual high-scoring awards for their respective groups but their margins of victory were slight.

Brown, colored athlete, featured with outstanding achievements in the Class A pole vault and high jump. He soared 11 feet 4½ inches in the former and cleared 5 feet 11½ inches in the latter. He also clinched fourth place in the furlong sprint.

Barbaron swept to a triumph in the Class B broad jump, took second place in the 220-yard dash and third in the century sprint.

MOORE WINS POLE POSITION

Averages 117.363 Miles in Qualifying Heat at Indianapolis

Indianapolis, May 21.—(AP)—Lou Moore, ordinarily a conservative driver, late today won the pole position for the 500-mile automobile race to be run here May 30 with a sensational qualifying speed of 117.363 miles per hour. A total of twenty-one drivers qualified.

Although it was a great day for Foxx, the slugger, it wasn't so enjoyable for Foxx, the league-leading hitter. Jimmy's homers were his only safeties in ten opportunities. He walked twice and his average for the afternoon was only .250. His home-run total has now reached thirteen.

Al Simmons didn't hit any round-trippers, but the bat of the broad-shouldered Milwaukee athlete was potent. He prodded a triple, two doubles and two singles out of ten chances and drove in seven runs, six of them in the opener.

Mickey Cochrane, Jimmy Dykes and Williams each had a total of four hits. Williams, whose bat had been silent in previous games last week, snapped out of his slump with two homers, a double and a single.

The only Mackman who wore the collar for the afternoon was Doc Cramer, but he was a frequent visitor to the runways. He was passed four times in the first fray and once in the closing engagement.

Phila. District Is Allotted Nine Places in National Open Golf

Seventy-One Entrants Announced for Competition at Springhaven First Week in June; Thirty-four Players Exempt

New York, May 21.—(AP)—Allotment of places for qualifying trials for the national open golf championship was announced today, with New York drawing the largest number, twenty-four of the 116 places for which 978 entrants will contest. Thirty-four players are exempt from qualifying.

The sectional trials will be contested the first week in June, the open will be played at Fresh Meadow Country Club, Flushing, Long Island, June 23, 24, 25.

The 1012 entries for the 1932 event are 139 under last year, with most of the loss coming from Middle-Western and Far Western districts. Districts along the Eastern seaboard generally showed an increase, New York having 203 entries this year, as compared to 155 last. Washington, Boston and Atlanta also showed increases.

Chicago has the second largest number of entries, 134 and sixteen qualifying places, but the Chicago entry list is forty-two under that of 1931. There were decreases at St. Louis, Minneapolis, Detroit, Dallas, San Francisco, Cleveland and Pittsburgh.

The thirty-four exempt from qualifying include the two foreign stars, Jose Jurado, of Argentina, and T. Miyamoto, of Japan; Tommy Armour and the thirty low scores and ties in the 1931 national open. Armour was exempted so he might defend his British open title.
