

Becton Outleaps Jones, Record

The leapers. Up and up Chris Becton and Jim Jones soared over the high jump bar. The speed. The form. The leap, and then a record shattering performance.

Becton, a Bensalem junior, leaped 6-101/2, and Jones, a Conestoga senior, cleared 6-91/2, smashing the PIAA District One Class AAA mark of 6-9 yesterday set by Upper Dublin's Keith Taylor in 1974.

The day was hot and muggy, but it had little effect on the athletes at the 52d annual meet at North Penn.

"I broke the meet record, but he did it better," said Jones, smiling. "The competition between us really helps. I don't think I would've made 6-91/2, and maybe it's the same for him."






