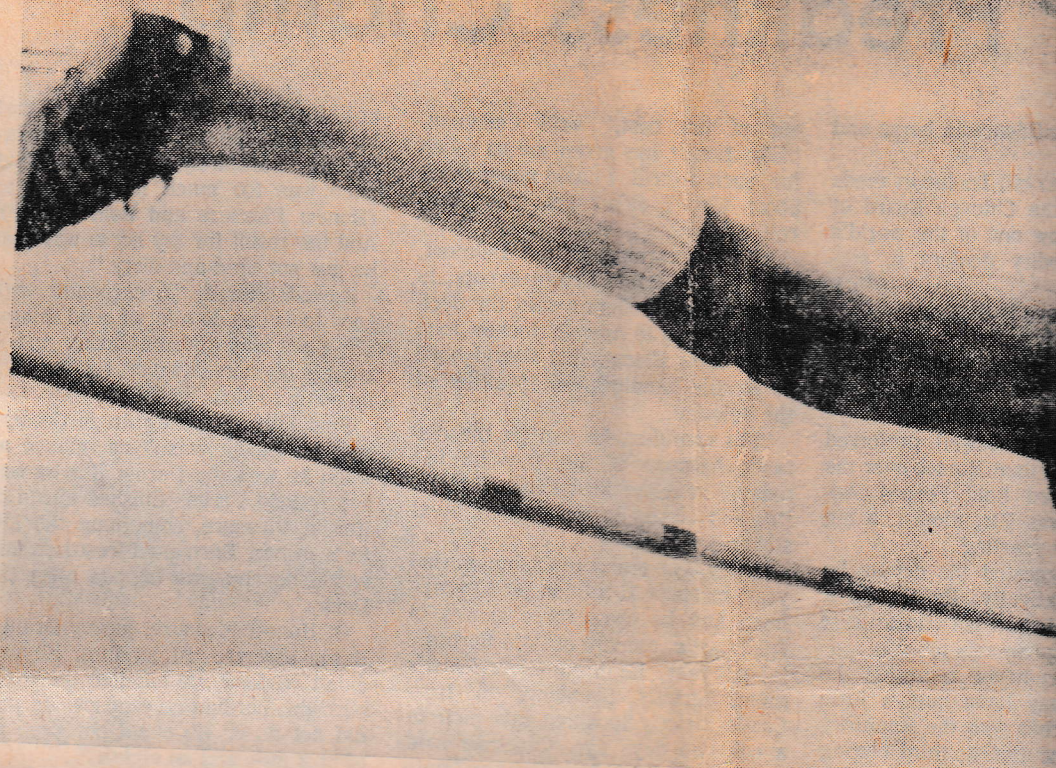
In non-league action, Kevin Salmon blasted a solo homer in the bottom of the seventh to push North Catholic past Frankford, 4-3.

Becton Outleaps Jones, Record

The leapers. Up and up Chris Becton and Jim Jones soared over the high jump bar. The speed. The form. The leap, and then a record shattering performance.

Becton, a Bensalem junior, leaped 6-10½, and Jones, a Conestoga senior, cleared 6-9½, smashing the PIAA District One Class AAA mark of 6-9 yesterday set by Upper Dublin's Keith Taylor in 1974.

The day was hot and muggy, but it had little effect on the athletes at the 52d annual meet at North Penn.

"I broke the meet record, but he did it better," said Jones, smiling. "The competition between us really helps. I don't think I would've made 6-9½, and maybe it's the same for him."

Becton did a 6-10¾ earlier in the track season, tying Cardinal O'Hara's Brian Melly (1974) for the all-time state record.

Becton and Jones have been battling each other since the indoor season.

"We have the competition, and that

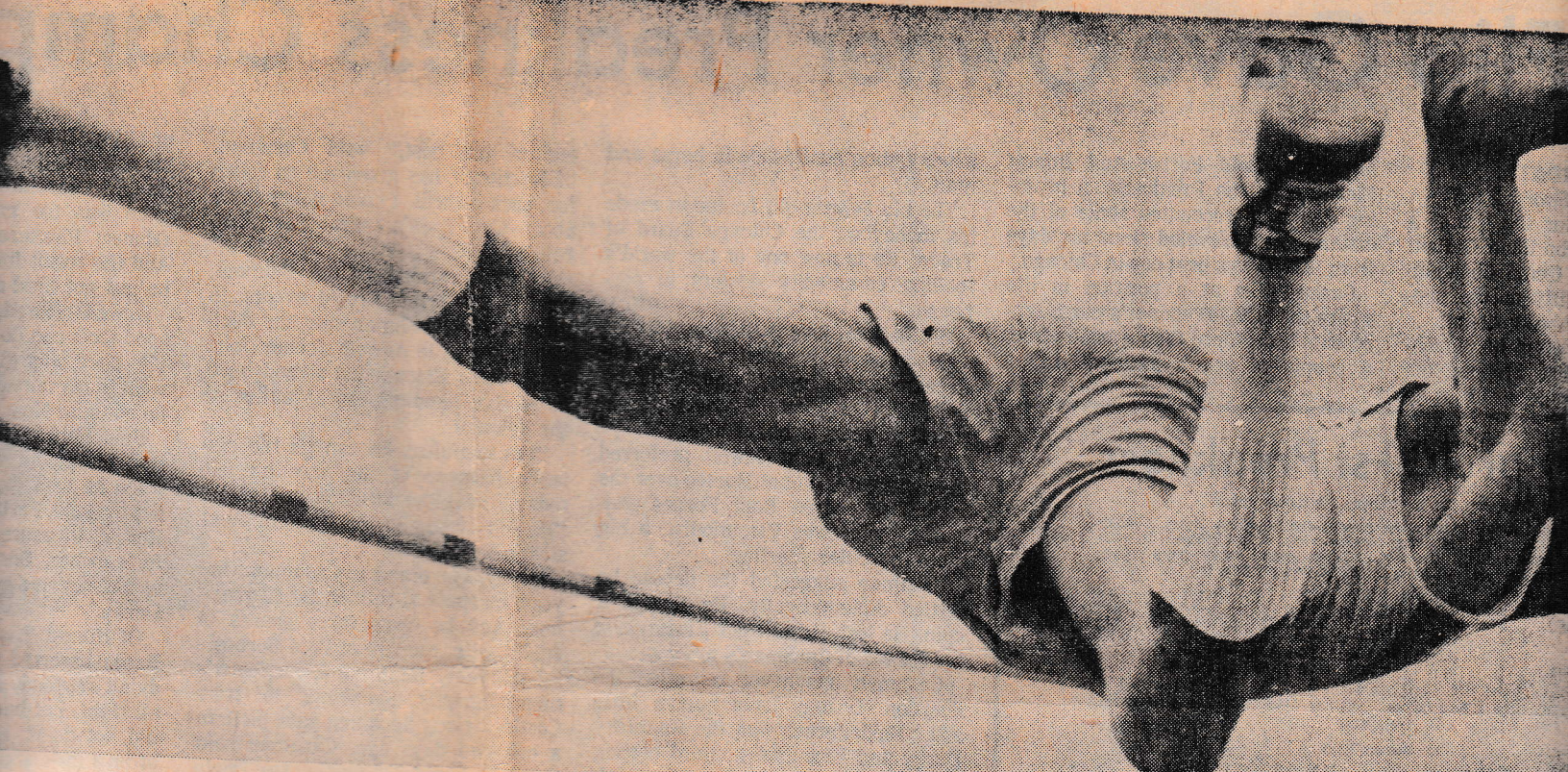

Carter Bounded 28-Year Man

Derek Carter considered the triple jump his best trick from a bag that also includes the long and high.

His logic was hard to argue with: in the triple jump Derek's previous high-water mark was 46-7, which is more than fair for an athlete in the PIAA Class AA classification.

Derek's top long jump in competition, 21-7, was also admirable, but surely nothing worth mailing to Track and Field News for national certification.

But in the District One championships at sweltering North Penn High, Derek Carter had a change of heart over the event he treasures most.

Trailing until his final jump, Derek busted a distance of 23-9³/₄ to break a 28-year-old meet record (Richard Hazzard, Springfield Delco, 23-1¹/₈, 1948) and overcome chief tormentor Russell Dickinson of Octorara.

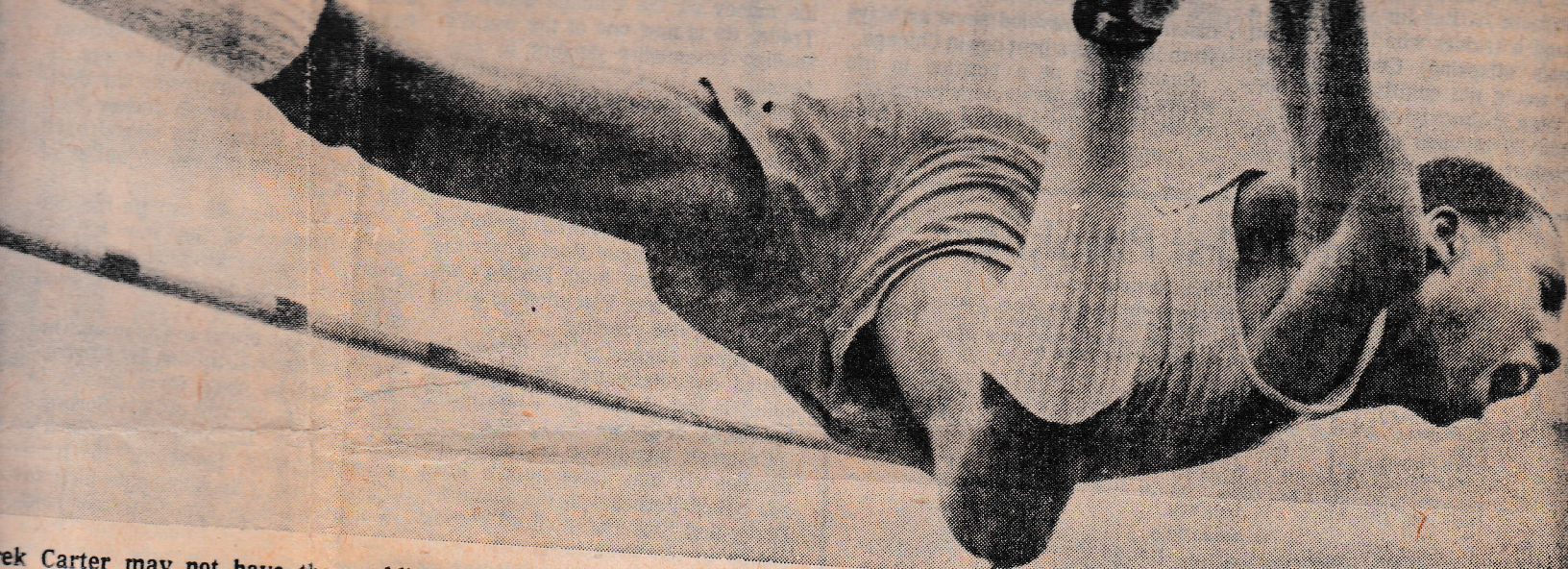

Carter Bounces 28-Year Mark

 Until yesterday, Darby Township's Derek Carter considered the triple jump his best trick from a bag that also includes the long and high.

His logic was hard to argue with: in the triple jump Derek's previous high-water mark was 46-7, which is more than fair for an athlete in the PIAA Class AA classification. Derek's top long jump in competition, 21-7, was also admirable, but surely nothing worth mailing to Track and Field News for national certification.

But in the District One championships at sweltering North Penn High, Derek Carter had a change of heart over the event he treasures most.

Trailing until his final jump, Derek busted a distance of 23-9 1/16 to break a 28-year-old meet record (Richard Hazzard, Springfield Delco, 23-1 1/8, 1948) and overcome chief tormentor Russell Dickinson of Octorara. Amazingly, Carter had improved by over two feet.

"A lot of the credit has to go to my teammate, Mark Carter," Derek said. "Mark (no relation) in only a sophomore's ancient record, owned a 23-4."

"Derek isn't always spectacular," said Darby coach Alonzo Covert, "but he usually manages to get the win. If someone is leading with 22-1/2 he somehow gets 22-1."

"Out in Suburban Three, he's been jumping off grass runways and falling down hills, almost. The potential for something like this was there at a decent facility. Most of all, Derek is a competitor."

Derek's effort provided a rare occurrence: making the AA mark (formerly B) better than the AAA. Only Lower Moreland's Ty Higgins (182-6 discus, 1970) and Morrisville shot-putter Dick Hart (62-0, 1961), the former Eagle, own overall records.

As a sophomore, Carter, a three-sport star with intentions of playing basketball at Lincoln University, did not compete in track. He spent most of his junior long-jumping year in the 17-18 foot range before improving at District time.

Nevertheless, Derek couldn't top Dickinson.

Yesterday, the Indians were without stickout hurdler Ernie Guldin. They also suffered a disqualification in the 880 relay for out-of-lane baton passing.

Perky Valley added five seconds: 880 relay, Bill Neill in the javelin, Chris Calkins in the 330 intermediate hurdles, Dom Martorana in the discus and Joel Derstine in the high jump, a school record at 6-4½. Calkins and Martorana are sophs.

Competing in the usually track-tough Bux-Mont League, Perky Valley this year won two dual meets for the first time. It and Upper Perk are the lone Class AA schools in the 10-team circuit.

"Two years ago we beat Upper Perk in a dual meet, then last year they beat us," Wiser said. "We came back to win this year. All three were close. I knew it would be close here, too."

Early yesterday morning, Wiser had his doubts.

"Last night was senior prom night," said Wiser. "A lot of the kids went. They looked it. I wasn't sure how they'd perform."

After practicing without a track, a night with little sleep is not too much of a handicap.
